EXECUTIVE ORDER No. 2002/3

ON THE PROHIBITION OF UNLICENSED RADIO AND OTHER BROADCAST TRANSMISSIONS UTILIZING THE AIRWAYES OF EAST TIMOR

The Transitional Administrator,

Considering the importance of the regulation, allocation and management of the use of entire spectrum of radio frequencies within East Timor for the benefit of the people of East Timor, for the preservation of public order and for the prevention of the unlicensed use of airwayes for improper economic, social, political or other advantage;

Recognizing that exceptional temporary measures relating to the management of radio frequencies were put in place by Executive Order No. 2001/3 of 26 April 2001;

Acknowledging that the said Executive Order provides, at Section 5, for the extension of the Order for such additional period as may reasonably be required in the event that the underlying circumstances still prevail;

Noting that the period of operation of Executive Order No. 2001/3 of 26 April 2001 has previously been extended by Executive Order No. 2001/5 of 8 August 2001;

Further noting that the circumstances underlying the Executive Order No. 2001/3 of 26 April 2001 still prevail;

Pending the entry into force of UNTAET Regulation No. 2001/15 on the Establishment of an Authority for the Regulation of Telecommunications in East Timor;

Pursuant to the executive authority vested in him under United Nations Security Council resolution 1272 (1999) of 25 October 1999 as reaffirmed by United Nations Security Council resolution 1338 of 31 January 2001;

Hereby orders that:

Executive Order No. 2001/3 of 26 April 2001, the period of operation of which was previously extended by Executive Order No. 2001/5, shall continue in effect until the entry into force of UNTAET Regulation No. 2001/15 on the Establishment of an Authority for the Regulation of Telecommunications in East Timor.
